

LETTER FROM OUR CEO

Dear Friends and Partners of LCHC,

The theme of our Annual Report, Resilient Together, is fitting for a year when all of us have worked to be resilient. We have not only been challenged by COVID-19, but equally by the polarizing views that have divided our society. It has been a complex time for each of us, and that has been equally true for the health center and the patients we serve. And yet, I am pleased to report that our year has yielded positive news that is worth celebrating. Our impact in both aggregate numbers and in many individual stories – of which this report provides only a few – is significant. Our mission statement continues to be our guide and calls us to resiliently “show and share the love of Jesus,” to be like Jesus when challenges come our way; and that is what our staff members have done.

Our positive news includes providing over 400,000 visits for care, ranging from traditional medical visits to fitness center check-ins to shelter-based appointments for our patients who experience homelessness. On the COVID-19 front we have provided 25,199 tests and 36,896 vaccinations. We have seen our COVID positivity rate go as high as 34.5% and drop to a current rate of about 4%. Our substance use treatment services provided needed care for 661 patients this year, a number that we expect to grow as we dedicate more resources to this important area of need.

This will be my last Annual Report as I look forward to retiring from my role as Chief Executive Officer in December. I have served at LCHC for nearly 24 years, a tenure that has required a measure of resilience. I look back over those years feeling a great deal of gratitude. The years have been full of challenging and meaningful work alongside a team of staff who I admire and respect.

I have loved serving at the health center and living in the North Lawndale neighborhood. My contribution has been made possible by many of you who are reading this report. Thank you for your encouragement and for supporting the great work of Lawndale Christian Health Center. I trust that you will continue to support our mission and our dedicated staff members who resiliently come together every day to provide care for our community.

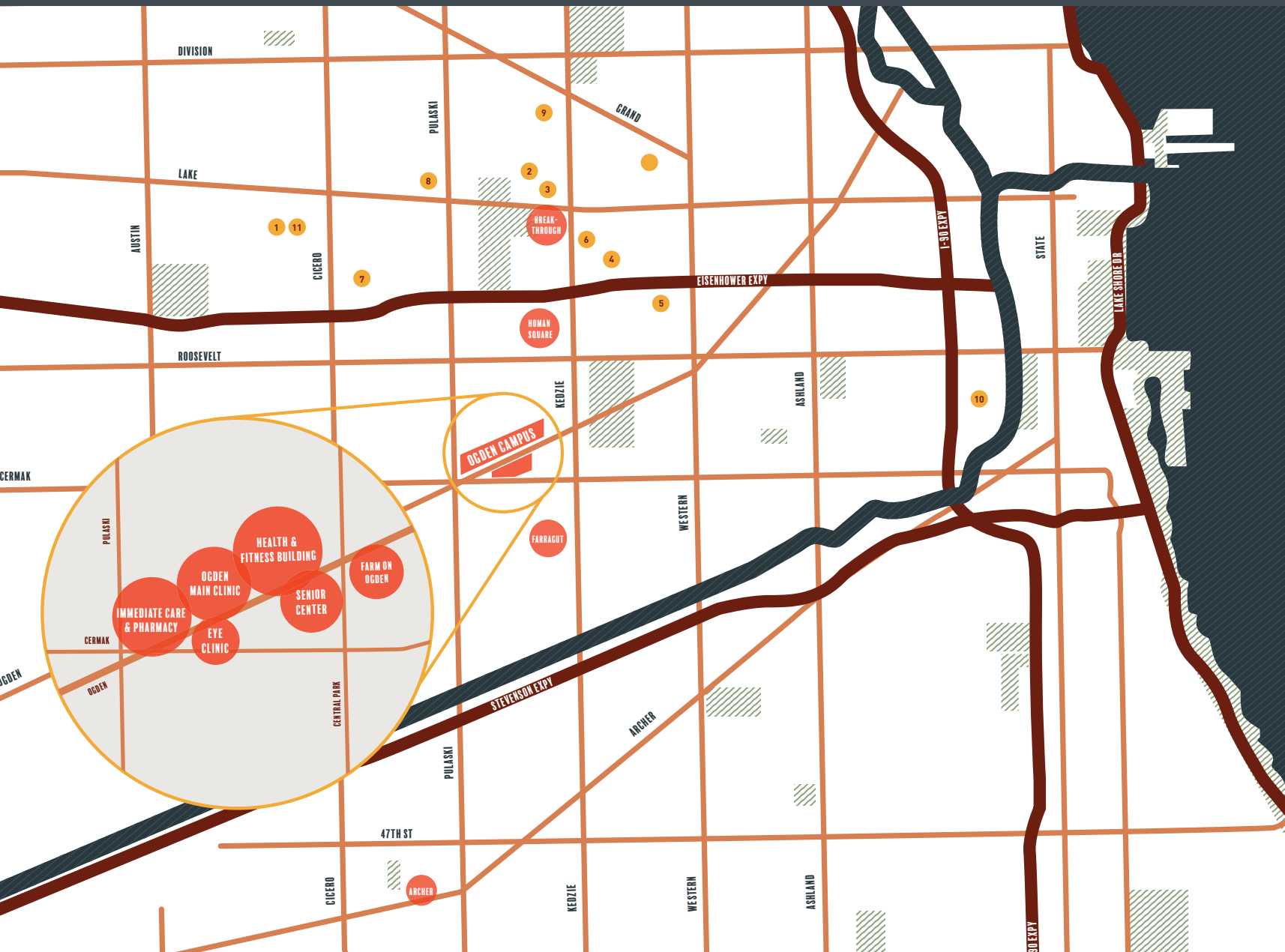

WHERE HELP COMES FROM

Nora Hernandez, APN, is a warm and lively Nurse Practitioner at LCHC who sees adult and OB patients. When she started working at Lawndale almost 20 years ago as a nurse, she never would have guessed at what lay ahead of her. She describes LCHC as a second home due to how much she has grown in her time here, both personally and professionally. Throughout it all, her heart for people and desire to be used by God has motivated her to keep going and reach where she is now.

Nora was raised and educated in Mexico, and after teaching elementary school there for a few years she moved to the U.S. to support her sister in Chicago. She worked various jobs to save money, with plans to eventually go back to Mexico. However, Nora began to notice the needs of her unique community in Chicago – others who had moved from Mexico with limited English and were facing many challenges – and wondered what she could do to serve them.

With that dream in mind, Nora decided to go back to school and become an RN to help meet the great need for bilingual nurses. Those two years of schooling were extremely difficult: English was her second language and she was also raising a family. Nora says, “I didn’t know it

then, but God was with me seeing me through.” Upon graduating, she worked at Loyola Hospital, before a friend from nursing school introduced her to LCHC. In January of 2002, Nora was hired at LCHC as a triage nurse.

“It was a hard job,” she remembers. “The phones were ringing off the hook and I found myself stressed out.” She noticed that other staff would pray and sing together before the start of each day, and she was moved to join them. These times of worship became incredibly meaningful for Nora, helping her face each day with renewed hope. Whether it was managing a full schedule or working through personal challenges, her awareness of God’s presence and deepening relationships with her colleagues provided a comfort and motivation Nora had been searching for.

“After two years, I applied for an opening within LCHC to be an OB nurse. I had always wanted to work with pregnant patients,” Nora recalls. “Well, I liked it so much that I did that for eighteen years!” As she built connections with these patients, she knew she was on the road to fulfilling her dream of helping and serving immigrants in her community.





During her time as an OB nurse, Nora returned to school to get a bachelor's degree. Her supervisor at LCHC saw the difference that Nora was making as a dedicated and compassionate nurse and told Nora she should consider becoming a primary care provider. Initially, Nora was surprised by this. But as she took time to consider it, she began to see how God was leading her. "I was frequently being asked by other providers to talk with their Spanish speaking patients," Nora says. "The patients would tell me their full stories, and I recognized how vital it is to have a provider that not only understands your language, but your culture as well."

Strengthened by the support of LCHC and her belief that God was with her, Nora set out to complete a Nurse Practitioner program and become a primary care provider for her patients. "It was so demanding. I was working full time, completing my clinicals, raising my family, and my mother died during that time," Nora shares. "It was only by God's strength that I made it through. He sent me the right people at the right time to tell me that I could do this. He used patients, too, to show me that I was meant to be a healer."

Nora finished her program in 2018, passed the board exams, and was hired to continue at LCHC – this time as a provider. Her grit and optimism have only increased as she has continued to serve the patients and community at LCHC. She can always be counted on to encourage her care team to do their work with love and compassion, both for themselves and their patients.

Each day, in Nora's eyes, miracles happen in the exam room. She believes that transformation occurs when a patient and provider form a connection. "At the end of the day, if I was able to just listen to a patient or offer a prayer, I know that God is using me," she says. "I just feel very grateful to do this job with the help of Jesus Christ."

MOVING WITH PASSION

Endora Turner uniquely embodies the resilient spirit of the Lawndale community. Her roots are deeply planted in her neighborhood and her life reflects her commitment to bettering herself and those around her. Ms. Turner is a lifelong resident of North Lawndale, an LCHC patient for over 15 years, a fixture at Lawndale Christian Fitness Center, and an energetic education aide for third graders in a local elementary school.

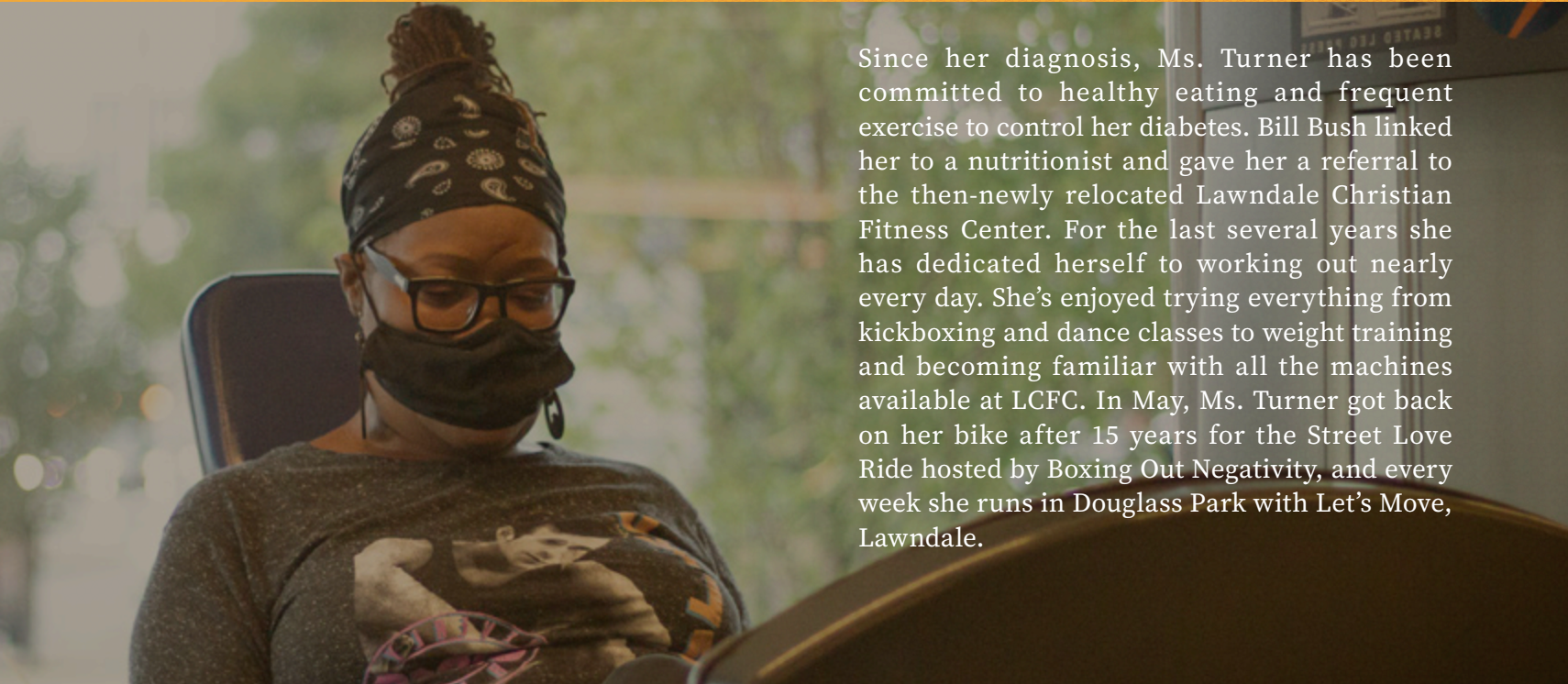
About seven years ago, Ms. Turner was experiencing some health issues and came to the clinic. Since her previous provider had left LCHC, she had a visit that day with Bill Bush, PA. “The reason I’ve stayed at Lawndale is because I know I’m not just a patient or a fitness center member.” Ms. Turner shares, “They are actually concerned about my wellbeing. I was diagnosed with diabetes, and Dr. Bush asked if he could pray with me – not for me, but with me. That really touched me.”

Since her diagnosis, Ms. Turner has been committed to healthy eating and frequent exercise to control her diabetes. Bill Bush linked her to a nutritionist and gave her a referral to the then-newly relocated Lawndale Christian Fitness Center. For the last several years she has dedicated herself to working out nearly every day. She’s enjoyed trying everything from kickboxing and dance classes to weight training and becoming familiar with all the machines available at LCFC. In May, Ms. Turner got back on her bike after 15 years for the Street Love Ride hosted by Boxing Out Negativity, and every week she runs in Douglass Park with Let’s Move, Lawndale.

“It’s people that motivate me,” she says. “Even when I don’t come in to work out, I will stop by to chat to Brian or Jerry at the fitness center, because they always cheer me on.” She says she feels better now that she exercises regularly and that others have noticed a change in her. “They tell me that I’m always on the go. Even at the school where I work, the kids ask me where I get all my energy from!” Ms. Turner hopes to start a running or walking club at her school to motivate the students to be healthy. “How can I motivate them if I’m not motivated?” she says about her passionate approach to life.

As she continues in her healthy lifestyle, she recommends that other people with underlying health conditions take the time to really get to know their primary care provider and develop that relationship. “They’re here to make you better,” she states, “and it’s been very rewarding for me both at the clinic and the fitness center to be honest and ask for help.”

Ms. Turner is a source of inspiration for all who encounter her. With access to both quality medical care and a place to exercise regularly, she has been able to turn her health around. As for the future, she says, “If I could move into an apartment right next to LCFC, I would!”



COLLABORATIVE HEALING

Every weekday at 9am, The Gallery on Ogden Avenue is home to Recovery Community, a group for anyone in the process of recovering from Opioid Use Disorder. These meetings include group therapy sessions, wellness activities, and time to meet with a social worker. This has become a special space where participants have formed a deep sense of community and support for one another along their recovery journeys.

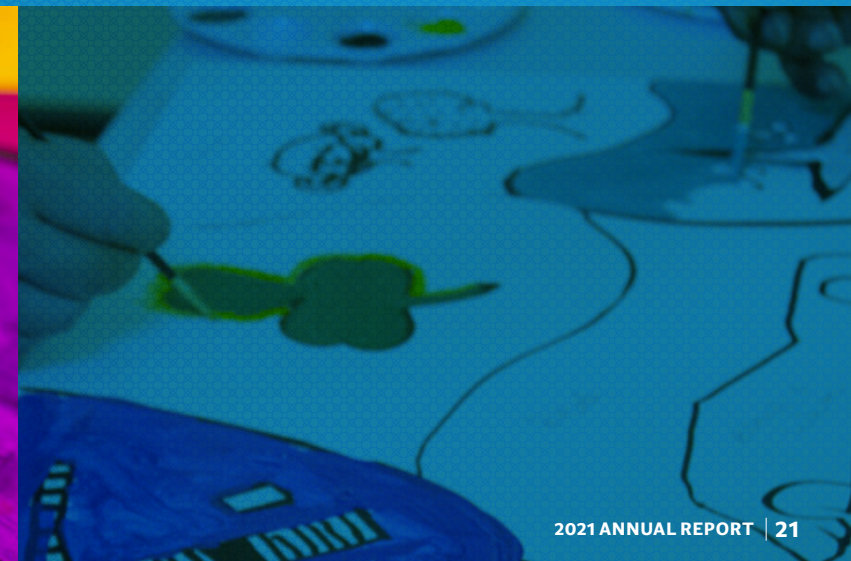
On Thursdays, Anna Tornquist, LCPC leads the group in Art Therapy to encourage a new way of sharing experiences and stories. Recently, the group embarked on a special month-long collaborative art project with the goal of reflecting on and portraying their collective experience of committing to recovery in the midst of COVID-19.

The group discussed themes that would inform their piece: resilience, strength, community, commitment, and perseverance. With these concepts in mind, they got to work. First, they each took turns drawing meaningful symbols on the canvas — a starburst shape in the bottom left corner, a face wearing a mask. Over the course of the session the blank spaces were filled with outlines of flowers, trees, stripes, a sun, and various abstract doodles. Over the coming weeks, they would add new layers to the piece: paint to fill the background, then magazine cutouts with patterns, objects, and colors arranged atop the painted canvas for depth and texture, and finally black marker to once again highlight the original drawings.

Each week as they worked, the group shared about their experiences with recovery. “The consistency of coming back to group keeps me positive,” a member shared. “It makes me more aware and keeps me on the right track.” One first-time attendee said, “I’ve been on the suboxone program for about two years now, but I was kind of struggling during the pandemic, so my Provider recommended I come to Recovery Community. It’s been really helpful.” Suboxone is a medication prescribed to help treat Opioid Use Disorder (OUD). LCHC’s Substance Use Treatment services include comprehensive medical care, medications, behavioral health services, and social work support. Recovery Community unites all these with the added benefit of peer support.

Many agreed while they talked and painted that keeping busy is a key factor in staying focused on their recovery goals. One man shared, “It’s important to have something to do with your time. You could pick this up as a hobby,” he says while gesturing to the artwork with a brush in his hand, “and keep your mind off negative thoughts.”

The completed work of art now serves as the beautiful cover of this report. If you look closely, you’ll see sketches, symbols, colors, and textures that relay the hard work, determination, and resilience of each person that contributed to it. When these individual components come together, they tell a strikingly colorful and dynamic story – reminding us of the beauty that comes through weathering hard things together.
