LETTER FROM OUR CEO

Dear Friends of LCHC,

In a year of great complexity, the stories in our Annual Report remind us of the simplicity of our mission, well characterized by the theme words of “Presence & Purpose”.

Presence is a quality of being with one another which moves us to extend love and dignity. Our staff members, our services, and our buildings seek to be present to our community, particularly with those in greatest need. This year, COVID-19 called upon our creativity, flexibility, and courage in new and challenging ways. In this report you will read about our efforts to be present with community members experiencing homelessness who faced particularly high risks amidst the pandemic. It has been easy to admire the presence that our staff members have extended throughout these unique circumstances in our COVID-19 testing centers, telehealth visits, partner homeless shelters, at Hotel 166, and in each of our clinics.

Purpose is a quality of being intentional. The words “Black Lives Matter” have called us to be more purposeful in naming injustice, and for those of us who are not Black, to be deeply self-reflective about our words and choices. In looking back, we can celebrate our diversity while at the same time be challenged by the racial injustices that were headlined by the murder of George Floyd. As we look ahead, LCHC will seek to be more direct and intentional in our efforts around diversity, equity, and inclusion and will do so in a way that affirms that Black lives matter here. The history of this country makes these efforts some of the most meaningful and hopeful that we can undertake.

I am pleased to report the positive numbers in our Annual Report. Over 65,000 patients consider LCHC to be their medical home. We now care for over 1,600 patients who live in shelters. Our future will include a focus on patients who have complex health care needs, particularly those that accompany serious mental illness, substance use disorders, homelessness, and aging. Due to the great work of our staff that was supported by government leaders, foundation officers, and individual donors, our financial numbers are positive this year. Our funders stabilized us during a time of uncertainty and vulnerability, and equipped us to be more impactful as we look to the future. We are so grateful to you.

We love the words of our mission, “to show and share the love of Jesus.” Jesus was present and purposeful in his work. We are committed to following His example by doing the same.

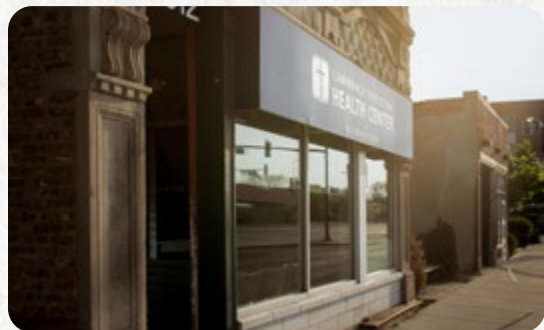

Patients had access to meals, medical care, medications, mental health support, and assistance in finding housing.



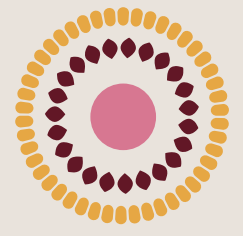
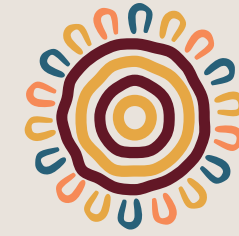
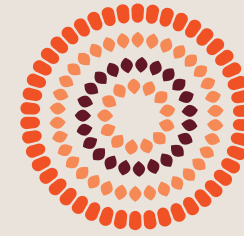

Heritage and Hope

One of the last days participants in the Senior Day Services program spent together before the shelter-in-place was the day they celebrated Black History Month. Two of the Senior Center CNAs, Chanel Finner and Demetrius Hiley, dreamed up an event that would encapsulate the joy, beauty, and depth of African American heritage.

The main hall of the Senior Center was transformed to feature a runway where staff and seniors alike showed off traditional African attire. The music had almost everyone on their feet, dancing and clapping along. "The whole room was lit up with joy," said RaQuira Welch, an LCHC employee who emceed the event. "It was unforgettable to see people of all different races celebrating Black culture. Everyone was reminded that fun is fun, no matter what color you are."



In addition to the fashion show, the celebration included a performer who sang Gospel music, a carefully curated history wall highlighting significant people in Black History, authentic food made and served by Geno & Tonies Family Catering, prayer, and a showing of the animated short film 'Hair Love'.

The event brought on joyful tears for some members, Ms. Welch describes. "Many people in the room, being in their seventies and eighties, have experienced segregation in some form. For the Black men and women here to feel celebrated, waited on, and honored by people of other races was timely."

Rosaline Brown is one SDS member who would relive the day in a heartbeat. "I'm the pretty one with the blue headscarf," she stated proudly, recalling the event. "We all had the best time. I danced my heart out – and they were telling me, 'You must've had some moves back in the day!' I sure did." Ms. Brown misses being at the Senior Center during the weekdays, but she appreciates that the staff have continued to check in with her each week during the pandemic.

In the midst of this historic reckoning with racial injustice in America, a memory like this one is a treasured hope. Celebrating the diversity of West Side communities is one of many ways LCHC is investing in a future of greater equity and inclusion. LCHC was founded with a commitment to address racial health inequities and foster racial reconciliation through intentional relationships. Looking forward, LCHC will look internally to focus on staff advancement initiatives, diversifying leadership, and training staff to tackle racial bias and inequities. Externally, LCHC will continue to invest in the local community through business partnerships and infrastructure that benefits the West Side and its residents.

The North Lawndale community is one that comes together in times of need and times of celebration. It's a place filled with people dedicated to the wellbeing of their neighbor. The elevation and celebration of heritage sends a message of hope to all backgrounds and all generations.



Together in Adversity

The COVID-19 pandemic has deeply impacted every corner of our country and the world. However, it has not impacted every community equally. Neighborhoods like North and South Lawndale, which are predominantly Latino and Black, have experienced the negative outcomes of the virus at far greater rates. Communities like ours have higher rates of chronic conditions, less access to healthcare, and are home to more essential workers who are put at greater risk as they continue to show up for work.

Thirty-six years ago, community members in North Lawndale established Lawndale Christian Health Center to meet the need for personalized healthcare in our community, which had been neglected in many ways for decades prior. As we face a brand new challenge, our dedication to improving the wellbeing of our neighbors remains the same.

Before cases of COVID-19 were reported in the Chicago area, LCHC leadership began monitoring the virus to prepare for the potential impact. The COVID-19 Response Team was established early in the pandemic, and met each day to discuss infection control protocols, clinic closures, service updates, and more.

As the number of cases in Chicago grew, the decision was made to close all clinic locations apart from those on the Ogden campus. An acute respiratory clinic was set up in the Main Clinic to care for patients with COVID-19 symptoms, and the Health & Wellness Center was used for essential in-person visits that were not COVID-19 related.

For the first time ever, LCHC began to offer a telehealth alternative for both medical and behavioral health consultations so that the changes and closures would not disrupt access to care. As testing became more reliable, LCHC also set up two drive-through testing centers to provide this needed service to the community at no charge.

LCHC's Mobile Health Team has worked among the West Side's homeless shelters for years, providing medical and mental healthcare to shelter residents. Individuals experiencing homelessness have higher rates of chronic conditions and comorbidities which could create poor outcomes if they contract COVID-19. In a shelter setting, social distancing is nearly impossible, making for rapid transmission of the virus. These specific challenges drew the attention of both LCHC as well as the City of Chicago. Our team expanded their services within the shelters to include screening for symptoms, free COVID-19 testing, and referrals to move elsewhere, if necessary.

Perhaps our greatest and most unique initiative was the housing of high-risk homeless shelter residents at Hotel 166 in downtown Chicago, which was highlighted in our summer newsletter. A total of 259 residents stayed in Hotel 166 throughout the five months of operation, and most of these residents were matched with long-term housing solutions following their stay. LCHC is grateful to have had the opportunity to serve the homeless population in this way.

A comprehensive response like this is only possible through working together. Our staff, stakeholders, partner organizations, and patients have united in a way that is truly beautiful to witness. Though there have been many new developments over the past months, all of them are built upon the foundation set thirty-six years ago: a commitment to quality healthcare in an environment of God's love.

One patient said, "During the most tumultuous time in my life, LCHC was still there for me. When I lost my insurance, my Provider helped me apply for an assistance program. They saved my life. LCHC truly lives out their mission which manifests through their works, one patient at a time."

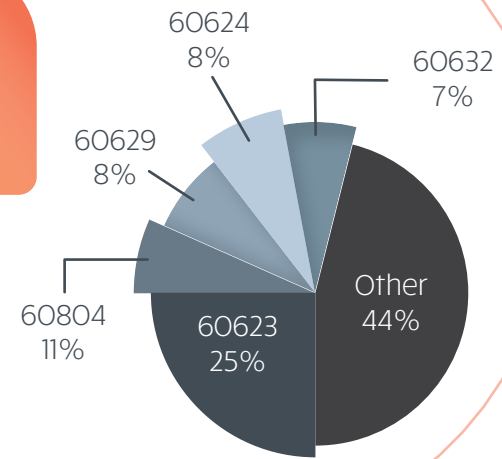

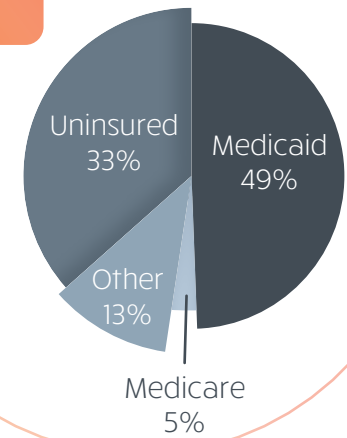

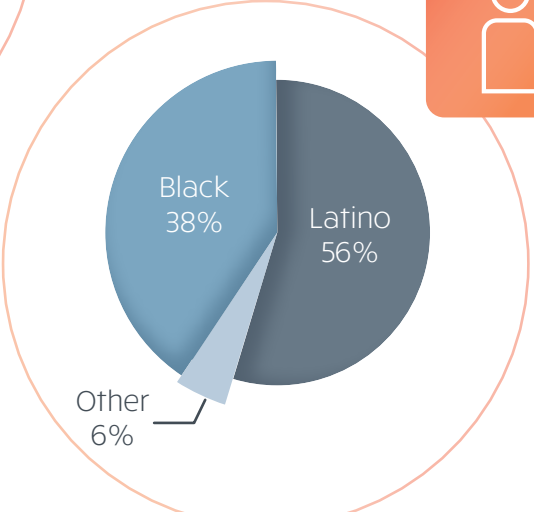
Age

Bold Like Brenda

In August of 2019, Brenda Harris went to be with the Lord after a critical cancer diagnosis. Having served at LCHC for over 30 years, her impact was of both incredible depth and breadth. The loss of Brenda's presence has deeply marked not only the accounting and billing department where she worked, but every person who encountered her at LCHC, at church, in her community, and beyond.

Feisty, loud, bold, loving, trustworthy, honest, prayerful – these are just some of the ways Brenda's coworkers and friends describe her spirit. Brenda is remembered as the kind of person that was always fully herself in every role and title she held. As a payroll clerk, she was unwaveringly committed to giving the best of herself to every patient and employee she encountered, even if that meant speaking hard-to-hear truths in the times that called for them. Brenda was not afraid to do what was best for others.

Karen Johnson, Supervisor of Patient Accounting and Billing and longtime friend of Brenda, recalled the way Brenda never missed payroll, no matter the obstacles. She made it her priority to see that every LCHC employee was paid on time, knowing that her work had a direct impact on the livelihood of her colleagues and neighbors. It was more than a job to her. When someone came to pick up a check from her, she would take the time to teach them about managing finances and encourage them to take important steps toward stability.

Karen characterizes her friend as a powerful mother-figure. "Brenda never wavered, was never afraid to pray, and never afraid to talk about what God meant to her," she said. She was also known for her hugs – each day, everyone she encountered could expect a hug from Brenda. As Chris Dons put it, "I think God took Brenda home before COVID-19 hit because he knew the one thing she could not live without was hugs."

Brenda honored God and others with her whole life and has inspired all of us at LCHC to follow the way she lived and worked with grace, joy, and a boldness that is rooted in the love of Christ.



It was a year of immeasurable loss for our community. Janice Rossbach, one of LCHC's founding physicians, passed away in January of 2020.

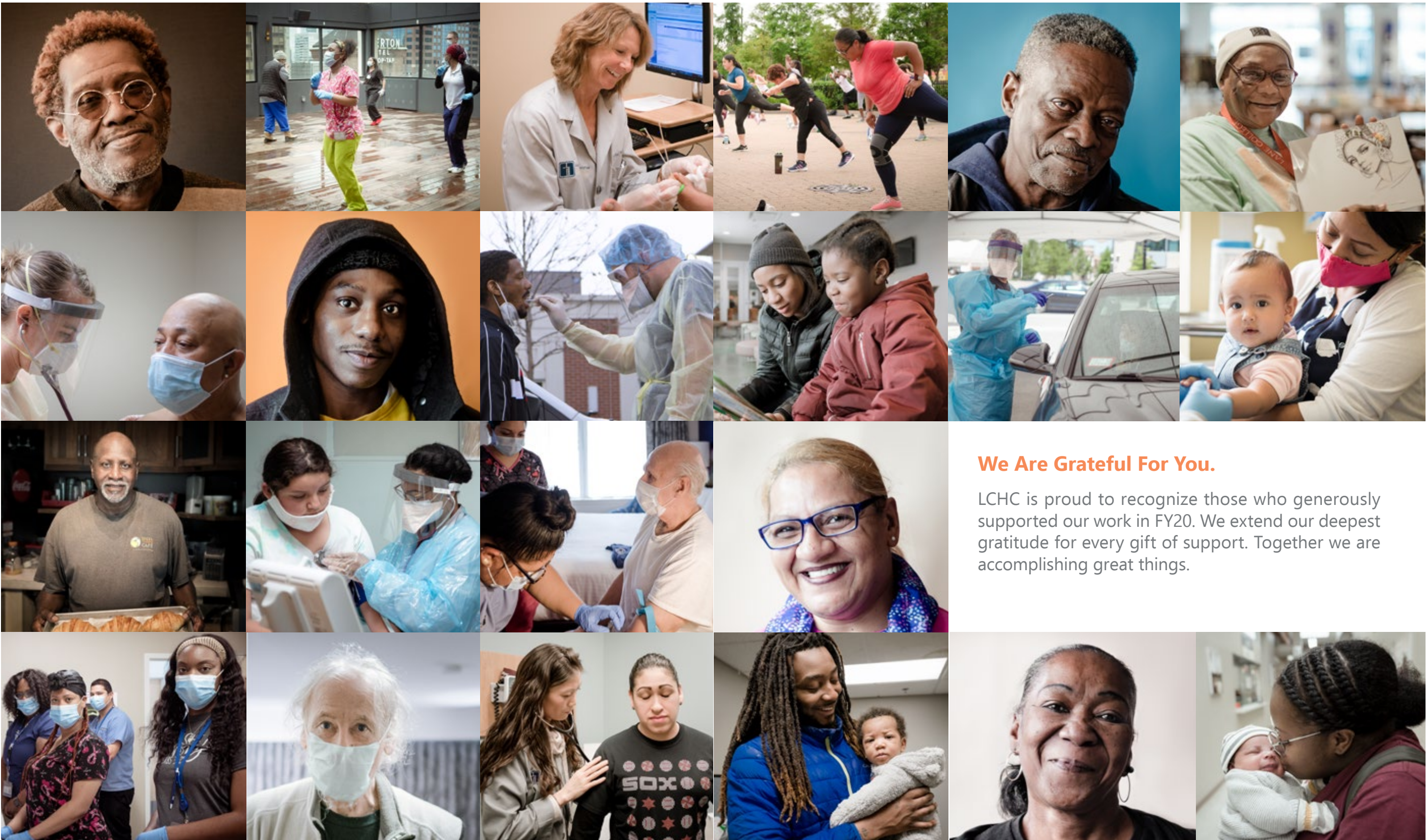
A Promising Look Ahead

This year has proven to be significantly challenging for many of us, including at LCHC and for our communities on the West Side. It is not uncommon for times like these to dampen our hope for a bright and prosperous future. Yet, throughout the past fiscal year, we've been working closely with community partners to imagine what an inclusive and healthy North Lawndale will look like in the years to come. Early in the fiscal year, our focus was on adding several new community spaces to the Ogden Avenue 'corridor'.

In August of 2019, we submitted a proposal for the Chicago Prize that detailed our plans for development. The proposed new buildings are the collective vision of several community partners, and include: a conservatory to work in tandem with the Farm on Ogden that will provide new opportunities for therapy services for trauma, addiction, and mental health needs; a business incubation center that will offer employment services, co-working spaces, and business coaching for local entrepreneurs; and a dedicated clinical training space to support future Providers and Medical Assistants, and provide needed healthcare and substance use treatments for our neighbors.

The onset of COVID-19 brought an unexpected set of opportunities for us to engage in. With the future of our neighbors still in mind, we've shifted our focus to meet the needs arising as a result of the pandemic. We'll join the City of Chicago's Contact Tracing Corps to identify community members with exposure to COVID-19. We are taking the lead in providing medical care for those experiencing homelessness and are now visiting our partner shelters five days per week. We've begun managing the medical stabilization unit at St. Anthony Hospital to care for patients with Substance Use Disorder. We've deepened our relationship with the Chicago Botanic Garden so that VeggieRx participants — those with chronic diseases like diabetes and hypertension — can receive weekly produce deliveries from the Farm on Ogden.

While the new buildings are not breaking ground yet, they are still part of our long-term goals for our community. COVID-19 has shifted the way we are thinking about our future as we listen to the needs of our community and grow the types of services that will allow our neighbors to thrive. With support from so many incredible partners, our dreams for a revitalized North Lawndale are alive and well.
