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
EDDIE JONES | ON TRANSFORMATION



HOMAN DENTAL | ALL SMILES

LCHC's brand new Dental Clinic at the Homan Square Community Center began seeing its first patients in February. The modern, renovated space features 6 state-of-the-art dental chairs, increasing the total dental capacity to 21 chairs across our campuses.

Having a comprehensive health clinic at Homan Square has long been an integral part of our vision for the North Lawndale and Garfield Park neighborhoods. The area was severely impacted by the loss of its working middle class in the 1960s-70s, 'white flight', and the closure of the Sears headquarters. The area was left in need of services, access to healthcare, and community investment. In the 1990s, residents of Homan Square and a talented real estate developer came together with a vision for a space that would address the needs for health care, family services, education, and a community recreational space. In 2001, the Homan Square Community Center on Arthington Avenue was opened. LCHC is proud to be a part of this unique model of collaboration of healthcare, education, and recreation services – a hub of community health.

The opportunity to bring a dental office to LCHC's existing Homan Square medical clinic, while updating existing exam rooms and waiting areas, is an exciting step forward in our mission to provide top-quality services to all of our patients. Generous support from the Illinois Children's Health-care Foundation and other donors allowed LCHC to continue to invest in the needs of this community, where access to dental care remains a recognized shortage and poor dental health impacts school performance, employment prospects, and overall health.

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
